### Time line

**24.08.1944:** First transport with 100 Polish prisoners from Auschwitz to Bisingen

**01.10.1944:** Transport with 1500 prisoners (Russian, Latvian, Lithuanians and Estonians) from the concentration camp Danzig-Stutthof

**30.10.1944:** Transport with 250 Polish Jews from the concentration camp Vaihingen/Enz

**26.11.1944:** Transport with 400 Hungarian Jews from the concentration camp Dachau

**07.03.1945:** Transport with 1000 prisoners, out of which 900 Jews from the concentration camp Buchenwald

**April 1945:** Evacuation of the concentration camp Bisingen

**12.04.1945:** Transport of 206 prisoners to Dachau-Allach

14.04.1945:

Transport of 563 prisoners from Bisingen to Dachau-Allach(in open freight cars surrounded by barbed wire). The remaining prisoners had to walk the "Todesmarsch" (death march).

Just before the end of the war then mayor Hugo Maier gave order to annihilate all documents connected with the concentration camp Bisingen, among them the name lists of the dead prisoners which had been kept in the registry-office.
